Comparison Across Countries for Brachycephalic Dogs: French Bulldog, English Bulldog and Pugs

Background

- Challenges around the health and welfare of brachycephalics has continued for many years, with important concerns about increasing popularity of certain breeds.
- Breeds of interest include the French Bulldog, English Bulldog, and the Pug. However, population data has been somewhat difficult to assemble.
- The UK and the USA have announced that in 2021 French Bulldogs are again the 2nd most popular breed. Other countries have suggested that the numbers within their registered pedigree populations are not as much of a concern.
- Certainly, in most countries the majority of pets come from dogs bred outside the national kennel club, or at least not registered within it.
 However, the influence of dog shows and pedigree dogs in general cannot be discounted.
- Overall, national numbers are difficult to assemble, but you can see the foregoing in the German data in slide 13 below.




Background, cont.

- In order to answer some of these concerns, the IPFD has assembled these slides to define what we know about registered, pedigree populations from some of our partners, and including the USA/AKC with what data we could access. Some of the differences across countries were expected, some are rather surprising.
- The data highlight that the 'problem' is not the same across all countries in terms of numbers, the percent of pedigree registrations, or ranking. It is hoped that this presentation will support meaningful dialogue within and between countries. This may be facilitated by the International Collaboration on Extreme Conformation in Dogs (ICECDogs).
- The health and welfare challenges for brachycephalic dogs are similar across countries, but the scope of the population within a country will impact possible solutions.
- Whereas numbers of these dogs are going down (significantly) in some national kennel club registries, that is not true for other countries.
- All countries should have data to create comparable statistics to those presented here. These data were created from publicly available information...but with a lot of work to get them into a comparable format. KCs could share data in a basic format that would facilitate ongoing evaluations and comparisons.
- The lack of good population data outside the KCs has been an ongoing challenge.


Summary Statistics


French Bulldog:

- The UK, USA, Ireland, and Canada kennel clubs rank French Bulldogs (FBD) in the top 10 of registered breeds.
- French Bulldogs represent over 5% of the newly registered dogs in Ireland and USA; over 15% in the UK.



English Bulldog:

- The UK and USA have
 Bulldogs in the top 10 of registered puppies;
- In the UK (2020) and USA/AKC (2018) over 4% of puppies registered in were English Bulldogs.
- English Bulldogs ranked 11th in Canada and Ireland with the percent of the registered population <3%.
- Most other countries Eng. Bulldogs are low ranked and low percentage of the registered population.



Pug:

•

- The UK and Ireland have the highest ranks for Pugs in popularity among new puppy registrations, 9th and 16th with almost 3% and 1%, respectively of the registered dogs.
- Pugs rank in the 30's in Sweden, France and USA, but all less than 1% of the registered dogs. Note that data for the USA are from 2017.
- All other countries have low popularity of Pugs.

Summary (see suggestions for moving forward at the end of the presentation):


- NOTE: these data refer to new registrations (puppies) in a given year at the major national kennel clubs. The extent to which they reflect national dog ownership is not presented.
- In most countries, the kennel clubs register a relative small percentage of all owned dogs. The exception is in the Nordic countries where a higher percentage of dogs may be registered.
- Data was incomplete from USA(AKC) and for some countries for 2021 or other specific years.
- Only the UK (The Kennel Club) and USA (AKC) have both French and English Bulldogs in the top 10 most popular among new registrations in 2021.
- The UK is only country with all three breeds in top 10 popularity for new registrations
- The percentage of the registered population for French Bulldogs is substantially higher in the UK, and higher in the USA and Ireland (IKC) than other countries.
- Some countries, e.g. France (SCC) and Sweden (SKK) have relatively high ranks for French Bulldogs, and the popularity is not decreasing; but the breed represents a relatively low percentage of yearly registrations.
- Canada (CKC) shows an increasing popularity for both French and English Bulldogs, but a high percentage population only noticeably for French Bulldogs.
- The Netherlands (RvB), Norway (NKC), Finland (FKC), and Germany (VDH) all show reduced numbers and rankings for all 3 breeds over recent years. Health programs and/or legislation governing these breeds are active in these countries, and that may influence these numbers.
- Most countries saw increased registrations in 2021, likely related to the pandemic.


Dutch Kennel Club (RvB) Puppies Registered 2010-2021 and Percent of Total Registrations



Dutch Kennel Club

Comments:


- Recent change in government requirements for breeding brachycephalic dogs started in 2019.
- French and English Bulldogs were in the top 10 for popular breeds in the registration data for new puppies 2010.
 Pugs reached 27th in popularity in 2018.
- French Bulldog popularity started to decrease as early as 2018.
- The popularity of English Bulldogs decreased after 2010.
- The popularity of Pugs increased and then decreased between 2010 and 2021.
- The highest proportion of the registered population (new puppies, N=34,000-41,000) was just over 2% for French and English Bulldogs and 1% for Pugs.
- In 2021 the percentage of the registered dogs was 0.07, 0.01, and 0% respectively.
- NOTE: these data refer to new registrations (puppies) in a given year at the major national kennel clubs.




Dutch Kennel Club

Comments:

- French Bulldogs showed an increase and now a decrease.
- English Bulldogs showed a marked decline since 2009. This coincided with additional rules from the Dutch KC.
- Pugs have shown a small, gradual increase to 2018.








TASSO one of two major public dog registries in Germany:

- You can see here that French Bulldogs are 4th most popular in recent years. However, still only representing about 3% of the population.
- The VDH registered French Bulldogs equal to only 1.4% of newly TASSO listed French Bulldogs

 and the size of the overlap between the two groups remains unclear.
- The majority of dogs in the public register are Mixed Breeds following by Labradors.
- The 10 most popular dogs in 2020 represented 47% of all the TASSO new registrations.
- Mixed Breeds (25%), the 9 popular purebred dogs (21%) and then, presumably all other breeds account for 54% of dogs – all less than 1% each.




Swedish Kennel Club Puppies Registered 2010-2021 and Percent % of Total Registrations



Swedish Kennel Club (SKK)

Comments:

- Total registrations puppies 2021: 62881
- French Bulldog numbers are increasing and they maintain a relative high ranking (see next chart) but still less than 2% of the new registered dogs.
- English Bulldog popularity has dropped just below 1% of the new registrations
- Pug popularity and numbers increased slightly, and remain fairly steady, dropping some in popularity (see next chart).




Swedish Kennel Club

Comments:

•

- French Bulldogs have been in the top 7-11since 2015.
- English Bulldog popularity has been dropping since 2012.
 - Pugs popularity and numbers increased slightly, and then decreased – as high as 14th and now at 30th.

French Kennel Club (SCC) Puppies Registered 2010-2021 and Percent of Total Registrations




French Kennel Club

Comments:

- Total registrations puppies 2021: 289,789
- French Bulldogs were in the top 10 for until 2020, then ranked 13th.
- English Bulldog popularity has been very similar and percentage of the population also quite stable.
- Pug popularity and numbers increased slightly, but still <1% of the population.


Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) Puppies (New) Registered 2018-2021 and Percent of Total Registrations



Canadian Kennel Club Comments:

- French Bulldogs have been similarly ranked (7th-5th, see next chart) but numbers have doubled and percentage of registrations increased by 48% compared to 2018.
- English Bulldog has seen a slight increase in numbers, with similar percentage of registrations since 2018.
- Pugs popularity decreased (next chart) and percentage of registrations dropped slightly.
- NOTE: these data refer to new registrations (puppies) in a given year at the major national kennel clubs.

Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) Popularity Ranking 2018-2021




Irish Kennel Club (IKC) Data for 2017/18-2021/22 Numbers of New Registrations and % of (new) Registrations




Irish Kennel Club (IKC):

- Ranking only available for 2021 (Jul20-Jun21)
- Uptick in that period related to pandemic increases.
- NOTE: * Only partial stats for 2022 – numbers can't be compared, but proportion of registrations might be relevant?




American Kennel Club (AKC) Registration Numbers and Percent of Population (new pups registered)



AKC:


- Unfortunately, we do not have full registration numbers for later years or for English bulldogs (partial stats follow).
- However, comparing with the next table (rankings) it is possible to extrapolate.
- We can extrapolate that French Bulldogs currently represent >6 % of the population of registered dogs (new pups) as their rank has increased to 2nd.
- NOTE: these data refer to new registrations (puppies) in a given year at the major national kennel clubs.

The KC (UK) and AKC Number of New/Puppy Registrations and % of the registrations English Bulldog



USA and the UK:

The number of English Bulldogs in the USA has been and remains high from 2009-2018. The percent of newly registered dogs is similar in later years between the UK and USA.



AKC:

- We do not have full numbers for English Bulldogs, but comparing rankings with French Bulldogs and their numbers on previous page, we can assume that English and French Bulldogs have represented a relatively high percentage of the registered population, and
- Pugs much less.

How well do registration numbers reflect the true number/population of dogs (AKC)?

These data from the AKC indicate that only about a third of pedigree puppies born are actually registered in recent years. So, one presumes that are 3 times as many dogs in the population than in the AKC registry – from AKC registered litters. There are numerous other dog registries in the US; and then there are more dogs that are not registered at all. We do not have complete data on breeds, but assume this trend affects popular brachycephalic breeds.

In some countries, a very high percentage of puppies from litters are (required to be) registered. It would be great to have better statistics describing national populations.

Moving Forward

- The material presented should support ongoing discussions on these high profile brachycephalic breeds.
- As can be seen, some countries have a marked and sustained decrease in new registrations for these breeds, others are (still) showing increasing or high popularity.
- Data is needed on the whole population nationally, not simply pedigree/ registered dogs, especially in countries where the latter are in a (sometimes small) minority.
- Obviously, solutions to ongoing issues must be tailored to the situation within countries, even if the health and welfare problems of the dogs themselves may be the same, everywhere.
- Data such as these should be compiled and studied on an annual basis to track any changes. KCs might make data available in a more easily analysed format, for sharing.
- Understanding what efforts are underway relative to education, health programs, legislation, and other regulations is necessary to try to understand changes in the registered populations as they occur.
